

## EDISON DIAMOND AMBEROLA PHONOGRAPHS

THE name "EDISON" on a phonograph means a soundreproducing instrument designed by Mr. Edison and built to laboratory standards prescribed by him.

Edison phonographs are more costly than other makes. The reason for this is that they are superior as musical instruments. This superiority is something that is not visible to the eye. Phonographs cannot be judged by their outward appearance. The musical quality of a phonograph depends on features of design and processes of manufacture that manifest themselves only when records are played on the instrument.

The discerning buyer compares and judges phonographs by the fidelity with which they reproduce music. It is on this basis that we invite comparison of the Edison Diamond Amberola Phonograph with any and all makes of soundreproducing device.

The Edison Diamond Amberola embodies the research work done by Mr. Edison in developing the Edison Diamond Disc Phonograph. The records are recorded in the same manner—that is to say, by the hill and dale method—and with the same observance of the new discoveries Mr. Edison has made in the art of recording music.

The Diamond Point Reproducer is designed along lines similar to the reproducer used on the Diamond Disc. There are no needles to change.

The Diamond Amberola mechanism is manufactured under the same rigid inspection that prevails in the manufacture of the Diamond Disc.


The design of Diamond Amberola cabinets is exceedingly attractive. They are notable for their graceful proportions and the excellence of the cabinet work. The ensuing illustrations give some idea of the attractiveness of these new Diamond Amberola cabinets.

The superior tone of the Edison is generally conceded. This superiority is not due to any tone peculiar to Edison instruments. It is due to the fact that the Edison reproduces the true tones of the original music without introducing a foreign and false mechanical tone. You will see how true this is if you will have Blue Amberol records of various kinds of music played on the Diamond Amberola.

The new Diamond Amberola has been priced with a view to making it possible for every good home to have a genuine Edison. Diamond Amberola 75 is of course the leader of the line, but the less expensive models are satisfactory in every way, and their portability commends them to many who desire to have a phonograph that can be readily moved about for dancing and other purposes. The Diamond Amberola is particularly suited to dancing, since there are no needles to change and a record can be repeated so quickly that the dancers need not lose a single step.

#### EDISON DIAMOND AMBEROLA

MODEL 30

This is the smallest Edison cylinder phonograph we make, and one of our very latest designs. For compactness and portability it is unique, while the very low price is another attractive feature.

Into this model we have incorporated some excellent features, making it a real gem mechanically as well as artistically. Among these improvements may be mentioned: helical gears, taking the place of the former belt, and insuring smooth, even operation; a suspended resonator that permits of practically one continuous sound-chamber from the Diamond Reproducer point; a special new device (hidden in the mandrel) that removes all liability to rattle as a record is being played; a new sensitive governor, located on the same plane as the mandrel; an improved method of raising the Diamond Reproducer point off the record; a convenient speed indicator which, when once set, regulates the time to a nicety.

The tonal qualities are good, clear and sweet. In fact, this new model marks a decided advance in this respect over any model previously put forth.

Altogether this is a unique Edison cylinder model at a very low price, embodying many improvements and fully capable of playing the Blue Amberol Records with entire satisfaction both as to tone and pitch.

For summer use, on the veranda or lawn, or for use in camps or cottages or on yachts, it is ideal.
